ARDEN ON THE SEVERN : 1955-1969

In terms of history, Arden On The Severn is only an infant. However, at the February meeting of the Civic Association, one of our new members suggested that an historical summary of the community and the Association would be a good way to inform some of our newer residents about activities in Arden and about improvements that have been made or that we hope to accomplish in the future.

To go back to the beginning, the firm of Beach Shores, Inc., bought the land, cut roads through the area, surveyed lots, and started an advertising campaign for a new beach community called Sunrise Beach. At that time, they envisioned a community of summer cottages, with perhaps a few year round residents. Many of the early residents here felt the same way and built summer cottages (most of which were later converted for full-time occupancy) although a few predictors of things to come built year round homes to begin with.

By 1955, there were some 30 families in residence in the five sections of Sunrise Beach. All of the streets were gravel topped, and to go from one house to another, you needed a flashlight to see the way. Realizing that many improvements were necessary in order to make this a really desirable area in which to live, some of the original settlers got together and formed the Civic Association of Sunrise Beach. This group was then incorporated under the laws of Maryland as a non-profit organization. Charter members of the Association included almost all the families living here at the time.

One of the first accomplishments of the organization was the securing of a few street lights on corners where they were most needed (since then, a few additional lights have been added each year, largely through the efforts of the Association, and we hope this will continue until our needs have been fulfilled).

Another early effort by the original group resulted in changing the name of the community from Sunrise Beach to Arden On The Severn. This involved contacting by mail or in person all of the individuals who owned lots to determine their wishes. This effort was undertaken because several lot owners who wanted to build homes were unable to secure mortgages. They had been told the reason was that the name carried the connotation of a beach community in which the lenders could not be certain that the proposed homes would retain their value if surrounded by beach cottages. The name Arden On The Severn was adopted following approval by a majority of lot owners and the name of the Civic Association was changed accordingly. The new name was accepted by the Post Office and others concerned with addresses in the area. No legal action has been processed through the County Government because of the cost involved; hence all property deeds still read Sunrise Beach.

Another very early activity of the Civic Association was the publishing of a local newspaper. Then, it consisted almost entirely of news about the Association meetings and plans, and social notes about who did what and when, the new people who just moved in, who has visitors, and so on. In those days, all

the services involved (including duplication and house-to-house distribution) were provided by volunteers and there was no charge for the paper. With the growth of Arden, the Newsbuoy has also grown and in the process certain costs have been incurred. For instance, in a community the size of Arden, it is no longer feasible to depend on volunteers to print and distribute the paper. Thus it became necessary to secure commercial printing service and use the U. S. Postal Service for distribution. Neither of these, however, can eliminate the need for volunteers. Someone must report the news to go into the paper; an editor is required to put the news items into shape for publishing and lay out the finished items in the newspaper format for the printer; a typist is required to type all of the material going into the paper and also to type address labels for the circulation list; someone must fold, stamp and affix labels to the printed papers and deliver them to the Post Office; a business manager is required to sell the advertising you see in each issue (this is very important, because the revenue from the ads pay for the printing). The Newsbuoy staff, for the past several years, has also undertaken the sizeable job of putting together a community directory which lists names, addresses, and phone numbers of residents, together with the ads of our regular advertisers and a listing of other community service organizations (fire department, police, hospitals, and so on), and a street map of Arden. A new directory is now in the process of preparation, and should be available in the next couple of months.

It takes many people doing many things in order to publish a newspaper and a directory and anyone who is willing to help to fill one of these volunteer jobs can be assured of a warm welcome - just call one of the staff members listed on page 2.

Originally the Civic Association conducted all its business meetings and social activities in the home of a member. It soon became apparent that a community building would be a necessity if the community continued to grow. Following negotiation by a committee from the Association, Beach Shores, Inc. donated to the association and transferred title to four lots on Omar Road. Once the land was available, every effort was bent toward the construction of a building which would be useful to the community for all types of activities -- civic meetings, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Teen Club, Ladies of Arden, and so on. A calendar of the regularly scheduled activities in the Community Building is published each month in the Arden Newsbuoy, and the building may be rented for private parties when it is not in use for a community function.

We had to buy most of the materials which went into the building, but almost all of the labor involved in this project was donated by a number of civic minded residents who felt the structure would fill a real need. The Community Building is now a reality, though it is not yet complete. We hope to expand the building and to that end, a portion of our revenue has been set aside in each of the last two years for that purpose.

In addition, the parking situation at the building is a growing problem which needs a solution. Steps are being taken now in conjunction with the County Government to provide additional space of this purpose. This is a project which will require both money and effort on the part of the community.

At the same time we were involved in the building project, efforts were also being made to:

1. have the County assume responsibility for the maintenance of our network of streets (this has included paving of most of the roads in the area, and we're still working on those which have not yet been taken care of),
2. get additional street lights each year and have them distributed according to need,
3. secure trash collection on a regular basis,
4. work with Beach Shores and Sunrise Beach, Inc., on items such as piers at the various boat docks, sea nettle nest at the community beaches, and so on.

Two months each year -- August and December -- we do not hold business meetings. The third Saturday in August each year is Arden Day. On that day we have a combination picnic and bazaar with games of chance for all ages, a cake sale, a white elephant table, 50-50, a grab bag, children's games, and rides for the youngsters when we can obtain them. This is our biggest social activity of the year, and we hope that all of our residents will come to Beach #1, eat a nice picnic meal (usually fried chicken), try their hands at all the games, and have a whole lot of fun (and since this our big money making attempt, we can't help hoping you'll leave with us a reasonable amount of your small and large change).

In December, we have our annual Christmas dinner and party which is held solely for fun and fellowship with our neighbors. This started out as an adult dinner party in the home of a member and the cost was underwritten by the Association. With the growth of the community and the change from an adult party to a family activity (Santa Claus always pays a visit and distributes small favors to all the little ones), we were forced to look for more spacious quarters. For the last few years, we have used the hall at Our Lady of the Fields Church. Even now we do not attempt to make money on this affair, but we do try to break even or come close.

Both of these activities require numerous volunteers to be successful, both in the planning stage and in the actual conduct of the event. Anyone who is willing to help will receive a warm welcome here, too.

The Civic Association also sponsors "Clean-Up Day" in the spring of each year. This is always held on a Saturday (when most people are home) and it involves the use of teams of people with trucks or trailers to cover all the streets in the community, and pick up debris which has been scattered along the roadside, as well as items which householders wish to dispose of but which the regular trash collectors cannot pick up. All you need to do to avail yourself

of this service is to place at the edge of the road the material you want picked up. (Obviously, these people cannot handle heavy items such as old refrigerators, ranges, furniture, so please don't put these items out.) This also covers the roadside from the entrance to Arden all the way out to Old Hickory. All of this "junk" is deposited in a central spot and then is picked up by the County Public Works Department on Monday or Tuesday of the following week. Last year, some 54 truckloads of material were picked up and hauled away. This amount of trash took quite a bit of picking up. The date for this year's clean-up has not yet been established but it will be announced at the next meeting and in the April Newsbuoy, together with the name of the chairman.

Much of what the Civic Association was organized to accomplish has been achieved, but a great deal more remains to be done. The two main activities which provide revenue to the Civic Association are the Annual Arden Day and Membership dues. Naturally, we would like to see every family in Arden join the Association and participate in the group's activities. The time-honored method for getting information to new residents is through the Section Delegates. This doesn't always work though, so we are using the Arden Newsbuoy to get the work across.

In essence, what we are trying to say is that the Civic Association is devoted to the betterment of the community. Some of what has been achieved might have happened even if we had no formal organization, but we believe the community needs a Civic Association, and the Association certainly needs YOU. Even if you have not been approached by your Section Delegate, won't you please try to attend one of our meetings (the third Monday of each month) and participate with your neighbors in planning for future improvements that YOU would like to see. You are not required to be a member in order to attend the meetings, but you must be a member in order to vote on any motions which are brought before the body.

Membership dues are \$3.00 for a family which entitles you to one vote, or if you prefer, \$5.00 for a dual membership which entitles a husband and wife to vote separately. The membership year begins in June, but we hope you won't wait until then to come and visit us.

ARDEN CIVIC ASSOCIATION MINUTES

February 17, 1969

The meeting of the Civic Association was called to order at 8:10 p. m. by the Vice President, Mr. Davis. 21 members and guests were present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and corrected to show that Mr. Atas' comments regarding difficulty in securing permission to locate nets at the beaches referred to all beaches, not just Section 5. The Treasurer's report was approved as presented.

Mr. Sudwarth reported that all except about two of the new street lights have been installed and the job should be completed soon. He also reported on progress toward getting additional pipe installed to extend the drain under the road so that additional parking spaces can be provided. There is going to be some cost to the Association and this will be brought up at the next meeting for a vote. He also reported that the guttering on the building is in need of some repair, and a motion was made and carried to spend the money necessary for these repairs.

Mrs. Couch reported for the Ladies of Arden. The plans for the entrance are in the hands of the builder. It is anticipated that the entrance will be completed and ready for dedication by Memorial Day. She also announced that the Ladies' group is planning a bake sale for March and will appreciate support.

The use of boat docks by persons not residents of the community was discussed.

During a discussion of membership problems in the Civic Association, it was suggested that many residents are unaware of the organization and its purpose, and that perhaps a brief history of the group might be published in the Newsbuoy. This suggestion was agreed to by those present and a motion that the Association absorb the additional costs incurred by printing and distributing copies of this issue to all residents was made and carried. It was also agreed that for this special issue, distribution of the paper will be handled by volunteers instead of going through the mail. A committee composed of Mrs. Sudwarth, Mrs. Maiatico, Mrs. Schreffler and Mr. Cover will be responsible for writing the history in time for publication in the March issue of the Newsbuoy.

The annual clean-up was discussed and Mrs. Niles reported that Mr. Niles would be unable to chair the project this year. Pending the selection of another chairman, Mr. Sudwarth was assigned to contact the County Government to determine a date for this effort.

A motion to adjourn was heard and carried at 10:00 p. m.


